In my mid-twenties I was appointed to Brookneal Church in south central VA. Back then, Brookneal was basically a quiet rural farming town with three other small churches. In addition to the Methodists, there were Baptists, Episcopalians and Catholics, but on Sundays, the best attendance was usually at a little restaurant on the edge of town - Harvey's as I recall. The parking lot and all up and down both sides to the street were lined with pickup trucks. Harvey's was a gathering place on Sundays for farmers while their wives, sons and daughters worshiped in one of the four churches. The men who gathered at Harvey's weren't bad men. They were good men, family men, hard-working men.

The patron saint of the group was a man by the name of Fred. Fred was seventy-seven when I first met him. He was a good, strong man, who owned and operated the largest farm for miles. But one thing about Fred that everyone knew – you would never see him in a church. I met Fred in the local hardware store. He knew who I was. I shook his hand and complimented him on his fine wife and children who attended my church. And as if he needed to explain himself, he said, "Preacher, I work hard, I take care of my family and I mind my own business. Far as I'm concerned, everything else is fluff." It dawned on me that what he was really saying was "Leave me alone, I'm not a prospect." I didn't bother Fred. But prayed for him. In my younger years I was naive enough to believe that my prayers were enough to draw him to church with his family.

Then it happened, old Fred showed up one Palm Sunday clasping his granddaughter's hand. Little Molly had extended an invitation he couldn't bring himself to refuse. And to my surprise, Fred returned on Easter and he kept coming back.

Fast forward about nine months. That entire church, and the men down at Harvey's Restaurant were really surprised when old Fred presented himself one Sunday morning to be baptized. Fred's baptism was the talk of the town for weeks. "Fred must be sick." "Guess he's scared to meet his maker." "I never thought I'd see the day." All kinds of stories were being told about why old Fred got baptized.

The last conversation I had with Fred, I asked him if he remembered what he told me the day we first met. ("I work hard, I take care of my family, I mind my own business?") He remembered that he had said it a lot, and still said it, but with a different meaning. "What's the difference now", I asked. I will never forget his reply, "I didn't know then what my business was."

I'm thinking the caption for this story could be something like, "A Little Child Shall Lead Them" or "Old Fred Minds His Business." But the story isn't just about Fred or little Molly. What it is really about is the transforming power of God to change a heart and a whole sleepy town taking notice. It's kind of like... an Easter story!



Who We Are

We are a 501(c)(3) non-profit corporation comprised of Stafford County and the surround area residents who battle food insecurity in our community. Working with churches, schools, and other non-profits in the region we seek to strategically eliminate hunger in children.

What We Do

Our first endeavor is a childhood backpack meal program with local elementary schools. We collect shelf stable food and pack meals for a family of 4 in non-descript backpacks (matched to school colors) for children to take home to feed their families dinner that night. Teachers identify food insecure children in the classroom and distribute backpacks to those in need. We collect no personal data on the recipients. There are no income requirements. If a teacher deems the child in need, the child goes home with food. All we need to know is how many backpacks are distributed in a given week, so we can bring more as needed.



In May of 2018 we entered King George County schools which includes all Elementary schools as well as the Middle and High School. We will be adding more schools soon! If we are not in your school, please have your school principal or guidance counselor contact us, and we will happily meet with them to discuss how to bring them the program.

Summer Meals

Stafford Food Security also partners with local organizations to provide nutritious meals to students during the summer as a lunch program. In an effort to expand our reach to families in need we now partner with Stafford County Sheriff's Office. Our backpack meals are now stocked in patrol cars, ready to be distributed to families when deputies see a need. We use collected funds to support these existing programs and create new ones. Our objective is a cohesive, nested, collaborative strategy to feed children without waste and duplication of effort.

Community Funded and Operated

Our enterprise is funded solely through donations from churches, businesses, and generous individuals. We partner with local youth groups, businesses, booster clubs, churches, and schools to collect and fill our backpacks. Every dollar we collect goes to feed a hungry child in all of these communities.

Minding Health Matters April 2019

Spring has sprung with daffodils blooming, daylight savings time, longer days, and more sunlight. With more sunlight our spirits rise, and we soak up more vitamin D, all good. However, the sun's rays also have the potential for harm not only to our skin but also to our vision. Our eyes are most susceptible to ultra violet rays in our teens, 20's and 30's with symptoms/damage only showing up later in life. Research shows there is probable increase in the incidence of cataracts, macular degeneration, tissue growth on the eye ball (surfers' eye) and cancer of the eye and eye lid. There can also be an increase in glaucoma symptoms and exfoliation syndrome, described as the development of dandruff like flakes inside the eye that can plug up the natural drainage system. Another concern is irritation from elements, dust and sand in the air.

One can counter some of these potential hazards with **SUNGLASSES!** Sunglasses are NOT a new development. The Inuit / Eskimo peoples left evidence of eye protective sun goggles used bout 2000 years ago. These glasses with small slits were made of bone, leather and wood. In the 12th century the Chinese developed a type of sunglasses used to protect the eyes and also hide facial expressions during court proceedings. The Emperor Nero wore polished emeralds to watch gladiator games. During WW I glasses were developed to help pilots see better.

Fast forward to current times to find sunglasses a serious fashion statement. Sir Elton John has a collection of over 1000. The most expensive pair to date is made with diamonds and gold, costing more than \$400,000. Most fashion glasses are made by just 3 companies. One doesn't have to float a loan to buy a good pair of sunglasses, but you do need to know what to look for. Fifty dollars in not totally unreasonable for a good pair. For the best protection for your eyes you need to consider several things. The most important criteria are the UV = ultraviolet protection, both UVA and UVB in a range of $95 - 100 \, \%$. The labeling related to this is not carefully regulated, so read the fine print. 'Bargain basement' sources are probably not a bargain for your eyes. Consulting your eye care specialist is recommended. Second, polarized lenses reduce glare and provide clearer vision, especially around reflective surfaces like water, sand and snow. This was developed around 1936. Prescription sunglasses are available. There are also photosensitive lenses that darken in bright light. Your eye care specialist can help you with these. Glasses that fit over your prescription glasses are also an option.

Fit is another important factor for good protection. The lenses need to cover the whole eye. The best glasses provide side coverage also. The frame and lenses should be centered, the bridge fitting comfortably on the nose to prevent slippage or irritation. The frame should be wide enough for the side arms to be straight, while the ear pieces have a good curve to hold the glasses securely. In the US it is estimated that a person loses, breaks or sits on a pair of sunglasses four times an hour! (I lost a pair in the North Platte River while tube rafting. Grabbers for the ear pieces are a good idea!) Many **colors / shades** are available. Gray and Brown are the most common. Other colors should be discussed with your eye care specialist. It is dangerous to wear sun glasses while driving at night.

Sun glasses don't work unless you **wear them**, especially on *National Sunglasses Day - June 27, 2019.* Throw on a wide brimmed hat while you're out. Wearing appropriate sunglasses is a good way to care for our eyes, the window to our soul. That's taking good care of God's Temple.

PRACTICAL PRAYING FOR THE HANDS-ON HEART

Jesus' words as recorded in Matthew 5:43-48 have probably elicited the most groans of any of His other teachings. The key words are these: "You have heard that it was said, 'Love your neighbor and hate your enemy.' But I tell you: Love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you, that you may be sons of your Father in heaven." Those of us who have been on the wounded end of words and acts have done a lot of "Biblical research" to try finding "just cause" as to why in THIS instance, we're off that hook. Having spent much of my own life ransacking my Bible for just that kind of pass, I have found this to be the awful truth: It is not what happens to us that matters, but how we respond. It is more important than the past, the education, the money, than circumstances, than failure, than successes, than what other people think or say or do (Elite Daily).

It's been my mulling over what other people **think** or **say** or **do** that has been like blowing the bellows in the forge of my heart, stoking the fire.

Finally, after one of my numerous rants, a close friend loved me enough to tell me:

"It's not what someone else thought or did or said that is the problem here. It's what you are telling yourself about all that. You <u>really are</u> the one pumping the bellows!" [Years ago, a cartoon strip called "Pogo" said, "We have met the enemy and he is us."]

So now, here's the GROOK that I hung up my bellows on:

*Some people cower/ and wince/ and shrink/ Owing to fear of/ what people/ may think./ There is one answer/ for worries/ like these:/ People/ may think/ what the devil/ they please.
